### HOW WE SUPPORT CHILDREN WITH SPECIAL EDUCATIONAL NEEDS OR DISABILITIES

At Earlham we recognise that every child is special and has individual needs. We want each and every one of our pupils to feel that they are a valued member of our school community. We aim to remove barriers to learning by working in partnership with parents / carers and a wide range of professionals from outside agencies to achieve the best outcomes for our children. Any child can experience difficulty at some point in their school life, albeit at different levels. These difficulties may be related to their learning, behaviour, emotion/social wellbeing, speech and language, medical or physical needs. We recognise that our children may have already experienced difficulties prior to starting school which may manifest themselves at any point of the time with us.

A child is considered to have Special Educational Needs where their learning or disability calls for special educational provision, that is provision different from or additional to that normally available to pupils of the same age. Earlham Primary is a mainstream, maintained school that welcomes pupils with a range of communication, cognitive, emotional and physical needs. Some of our pupils with SEN/D will have an EHCP and other may appear on our SEN/D support list.

<p><b>What type of school are we?</b></p> <p><b>What age children does the school admit?</b></p>	<p>Earlham is a two form primary school in North London. The school has a higher than average socio-economic deprivation index and the vast majority of the children speak English as an additional language. The school is led by the Head Teacher, Natasha Rezai, with a Governor designated for SEN (Jill House) and Pupil Premium champion (Aziz Ahmed).</p> <p>The school admits children from nursery all the way up to Year 6.</p>

<p><b>How does the school identify SEN/D?</b></p>	<p>As a whole school we work together to identify the individual needs of each pupil and decide on the best course of action at any given time.</p> <p>Information leading to the identification of children's SEN/D may come from a number of sources. These include:</p> <p>1)  Pre-school - liaison with pre-schools or nurseries, pre-school support from external agencies, information provided by parents/carers and pre-school transition meetings</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• In school - staff observations, Foundation Stage Profile, assessments, reports from external agencies, reports from previous schools, standardised screening and assessment tools. Staff and parents can raise concerns about a child with the SENCO at any time. A decision will be made regarding support, if appropriate, based on the school's observations, tracking of assessment data, progress after interventions and a discussion between the class teacher, learning support staff and the SENCO.</li> </ul> <p>2)  The SENCO will decide which type of support will be required to help the child. This may include:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Quality first teaching strategies and resources for support in class</li> <li>• Differentiated curriculum support strategies for SEN/D in class</li> <li>• Access to additional interventions for SEN/D and direct work with outside agencies</li> </ul>
<p><b>How does your school ensure that children who need extra help are identified early?</b></p> <p><b>What should a parent do if they think their child may have special educational needs?</b></p>	<p>If you have concerns about your child's progress you should speak to your child's class teacher and share your concerns as early as possible. This will enable the class teacher to address your concerns and provide appropriate support where required or make a referral to the SENCO.</p> <p>If concerns need to be addressed at a deeper level and you have spoken with the teacher, you should speak to the SENCO, Mr Chatterton.</p> <p>If you wish to increase the level of support, you may speak to the Head Teacher or school SEND Governor.</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Each child's progress is assessed each half term by their class teachers and based on this assessment, an evaluation of progress is made with a decision as to whether the progress is appropriate or needs to be examined and accelerated.</li> <li>• If normal classroom provision is not sufficient the class teacher will plan specifically to target progress for the pupil to accelerate progress and raise attainment (Quality First Teaching)</li> <li>• Baseline tracking is determined at the start of each year, so that progress can be effectively monitored.</li> </ul>

	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• The class teacher will also refer the child to the phase leader in charge of the child’s key stage during half-termly pupil progress meetings, who will timetable interventions delivered by other adults working with the children. These interventions will be monitored half-termly to ensure impact</li> <li>• If adequate progress from this support is not sufficient to achieve progress then the class teacher will refer the child to the SENCO using the appropriate referral form (based on the nature of the child’s difficulty) to investigate further. The teacher will advise the child’s parents of the referral.</li> <li>• The SENCO will first observe the child, if further investigations are deemed to be required, he will assess using a number of measures to assess the child’s abilities and skills.</li> <li>• The SENCO may place the child on the SEND/Inclusion Register for SEN support provision to be facilitated by the school.</li> <li>• The SENCO will meet with the child’s parents each term to discuss the assessment results, what actions the school can offer the child (e.g. referral to speech and language services), and may include SEN teaching at the school (1:1 and small intervention groups).</li> <li>• If adequate progress after a period of time is not made with SEN support then the SENCO will discuss with the child’s parents the option of applying for additional funding through an ‘Educational Health Care Plan- EHCP’ through Haringey LEA.</li> <li>• If a decision is made to apply for a EHCP then referrals are made through Haringey LEA to assist in such an application</li> <li>• If an EHCP is granted (the threshold for funding is met), then the extra funding granted will be used for school-based pupil-based provision. This provision will be strategically planned through consultation with stake-holders including Parents, pupil and the School</li> </ul>
<p><b>What does our school do to help children with special educational needs?</b></p>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• The School champions Diversity and Inclusion and holds an annual Inclusion week to champion different abilities and to create an atmosphere of Respect for all. This is emphasised within the curriculum and in assemblies.</li> <li>• The school maintains a regularly updated provision map that details the range of provisions the school uses in supporting pupils with SEN, In this way, the school can monitor the effectiveness of each program</li> <li>• The class teacher is responsible for the pupil’s progress; deploying and using resources given. Supervision of the pupil includes lunchtime provision through the team of SMSAs; during curriculum time, other staff might be in immediate charge such as during PE and Music provision.</li> <li>• The SENCO along with parents and external specialists from Haringey LEA will plan and monitor the provision for children with SEND. The Headteacher will be consulted by the SENCO to determine final level of provision and resource.</li> <li>• Each term the SENCO will invite parents with children on the SEND/Inclusion Register for a review meeting</li> </ul>

to discuss progress and plan provision for the next term. In these meetings parent's voice is very important as home-school co-operation has been shown to improve pupil outcomes.

- Each year the SENCO will hold an annual review of each child on the SEND/Inclusion register (in some cases more than one annual review will be required), along with termly review of reports from external specialists involved with each child. The SENCO will continuously review the effectiveness of each intervention to determine if it should be continued, modified, or discontinued.
- Each year the SENCO will hold annual review meetings for all children with an EHCP of SEND. This is a statutory requirement of the school and draws collaborative input from the child, the parents, a child's 121 Educator, the child's teachers, and any other educational profession working with the child.
- Each year the school works with parents to review SEND policies and procedures, and SEND items are included on school questionnaires to parents. Parents' voice is very important to the school.

#### **WHO ARE THE BEST PEOPLE TO TALK TO ABOUT CHILDREN WITH SEND AT OUR SCHOOL?**

##### **The SENCO (Special Educational Needs co-ordinator) will be responsible for:**

Co-ordinating all the support for children with special educational needs or disabilities (SEND) and developing the school's SEND Policy to make sure all our children get a consistent, high quality response to meeting their needs in school.

- Ensuring that you are:
  - Involved in supporting your child's learning
  - Kept informed about the support your child is getting
  - Involved in reviewing progress
- Liaising with all the other agencies, who may come into school to help support your child's learning e.g. Speech and Language Therapy, Educational Psychology, Occupational Therapy etc.
- Making assessments of children's learning and progress to inform choice of interventions and support.
- Alongside Class Teachers generating support trackers and sharing and reviewing these with parents at least once each term and planning for the next term.
- Termly updating the school's SEND/Inclusion register (a system for ensuring all the SEND needs of pupils in this school are known) and making sure that there are very good records of your child's progress and needs.
- Providing specialist support for teachers and support staff in the school so they can help children with SEND in the school achieve the best progress possible.
- Working with parents to develop SEND policies that are robust and relevant.

##### **Class Teacher responsible for:**

- Providing high quality teaching and tracking of the progress of your child. Identifying, planning and

	<p>delivering any additional help your child may need (eg. targeted work, additional support) and referral to the SENCO as necessary.</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Developing appropriate support (in consultation with the SENCO) and planning and tracking this support.</li> <li>• Ensuring that all staff working with your child in school are enabled to deliver the planned work/programme for your child, to achieve the best possible progress.</li> <li>• Ensuring that the school’s SEND Policy is followed in the classroom and for all the pupils they teach including pupils with any SEND.</li> </ul> <p><b>Head Teacher responsible for:</b></p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• The day to day management of all aspects of the school, this includes the support for children with SEND.</li> <li>• Delegating responsibility to the SENCO (for assessment, recording and documentation and liaison with agencies and advice to teachers) and Class Teachers to deliver appropriate provision.</li> <li>• Ensuring that the Governing Body is kept up to date about any issues in the school relating to SEND. Alongside the Governing Body, ensuring that SEND funding is allocated securely (this will depend upon accurate identification and appropriate paperwork from the SENCO).</li> </ul> <p><b>Governing Body responsible for:</b></p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Making sure that the necessary support is provided for any child with recognised SEND.</li> <li>• Alongside the Head Teacher they have responsibility for monitoring the SEND budget.</li> </ul>
<p><b>How do teachers match the curriculum to an individual child’s needs?</b></p>	<p>At Earlham, we recognise that early intervention and support is paramount in supporting your child’s development. Their progress is carefully monitored as part of our regular pupil progress cycle. If your child is identified as not making progress or is believed to have additional needs the class teacher will set up a meeting to discuss this with you in more detail and to:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• listen to any concerns you may have</li> <li>• plan any additional support your child may require</li> <li>• discuss with you any possible referrals to outside professionals to support your child’s learning.</li> </ul> <p>The latest Education Act specifies that all teachers are teachers of SEN, thus they are responsible for the differentiation of work for all pupils in their classroom. This means they have a direct responsibility to deploy and manage any support staff in their classrooms, so that all children receive effective teaching. If you have any concerns for your child’s education, the class teacher should be the first point of contact.</p> <p><b>How will the teaching be adapted for your child with SEND?</b></p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Class Teachers are responsible for planning lessons according to the specific needs of all groups of children</li> </ul>

	<p>in their class, and will ensure that your child's needs are met through effective differentiation of the work and careful planning.</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Trained support staff can also adapt the teacher's planning to support the needs of your child where necessary to ensure further differentiation if required.</li> <li>• Specific resources and strategies, which may include additional adults, will be used to support your child individually and in groups and this will be logged in the tracking.</li> <li>• Planning and teaching will be adapted on a daily basis if needed to meet your child's learning needs.</li> <li>• Smaller focussed teaching groups in reading, writing and maths are provided for children who are identified as needing additional support.</li> <li>• For some children 1:1 programmes are required to support their continued development and progress.</li> </ul>
<p><b>How do children with SEN/D participate in activities at Earlham Primary School?</b></p>	<p>We are committed to providing a safe, welcoming and inclusive learning environment where every child, including those with SEN/D, is treated equally and provided with an opportunity to have access to every activity and learning experience. Our expectations are high and we aim to provide exciting, memorable and stimulating learning experiences that every child can access at their individual level.</p> <p>We will always endeavour to consider your child's interests and to make reasonable adjustments wherever possible. At Earlham, pupils with SEN/D are fully included in activities throughout the school day. All our classrooms are inclusion friendly and where appropriate, we provide additional support to ensure that every child is able to access the national curriculum. To ensure that this happens, a child with SEN/D may be provided with extra support in class, differentiated work, a behaviour plan or individual targets. As part of normal class differentiation, curriculum content and ideas are adapted and made more accessible through the use of visual, tactile and concrete resources.</p>
<p><b>How are our school's resources allocated and matched to children's special educational needs?</b></p> <p><b>How is our school's special educational needs budget allocated?</b></p> <p><b>How decisions are made about what type and how much support an individual child will receive?</b></p>	<p>The school budget, received from Haringey LA, includes money for supporting children with SEND:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• The Head Teacher determines the budget for SEND in consultation with the school governors based on information and proposals she receives from the SENCO and the tracking of budget expenditure, on the basis of needs in the school.</li> <li>• The Head Teacher and the Governors discuss all the information they have about SEND in the school, including: <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>- the children getting extra support already</li> <li>- the children needing extra support</li> <li>- the children who have been identified as not making as much progress as would be expected</li> <li>-</li> </ul> </li> </ul> <p>They will decide which resources/training and support is needed in order to provide effective provision for children</p>

<p><b>How do we monitor a child's progress and how do you communicate with parents about their child's progress?</b></p>	<p>with SEND.</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Your child's progress is continually monitored by his/her class teacher through a regular cycle of Pupil Progress meetings that are attended by members of the Senior Leadership Team and the SENCO.</li> <li>• Your child's progress is reviewed formally every half term by the Class Teacher and assessment levels given in reading, writing and maths.</li> <li>• If your child is in Year 1 and above, but is not yet reaching expected levels, more sensitive assessment tools are used which shows their level in more detail and will also show smaller but significant steps of progress. At the moment these are referred to as 'P levels', although they will soon be replaced by new assessment guidelines.</li> <li>• At the end of each key stage (i.e. at the end of year 2 and year 6) all children are required to be formally assessed using Standard Assessment Tests (SATs). This is something the government requires all schools to do and are the results that are published nationally.</li> <li>• Children who currently have a Statement/Education Health Care Plan or receive additional support from external professionals will have an SEN review which looks at the current support in place for your child. This is reviewed termly with parental involvement, and the plan for the next term made.</li> </ul> <p>In addition to this the progress of children with a statement of SEND/EHC Plan is formally reviewed at an Annual Review with parents, class teacher, SENCO and other professionals who may be involved with the child's education.</p> <p>The SENCO will also review and check that your child is making good progress within any intervention groups that they take part in during the school year.</p> <p><b>Communication with parents</b></p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• The school has a monthly newsletter</li> <li>• Each year group holds a welcome meeting with parents to provide information, outline expectations and to explain the curriculum.</li> <li>• Meetings are held for new parents and those in year 6 to discuss transition choices</li> <li>• Termly parent evenings are held to discuss your child's progress</li> <li>• Annual reports are provided in the Summer term for each child</li> <li>• Teachers and phase leaders are available to meet with parents on a daily basis before and after school. Parents should speak to the school office if they wish to arrange to meet with staff.</li> <li>•</li> </ul> <p><b>What support do we have for you as a parent of a child with SEND?</b></p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• The class teacher is regularly available to discuss your child's progress or any concerns you may have and to share information about what is working well at home and school so similar strategies can be used.</li> <li>• The SENCO is also available to meet with you to discuss your child's progress or any concerns/worries you</li> </ul>

	<p>may have and can help to signpost appropriate areas of support that you may wish to access.</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• All information from outside professionals will be discussed with you with the person involved directly, or where this is not possible, in a report.</li> <li>• Tracking will be shared and reviewed with your involvement each half term.</li> <li>• Homework will be adapted as needed to your child's individual needs.</li> <li>• A home/school contact book may be used to support communication with you, when this has been agreed to be useful for you and your child.</li> </ul>

<p><b>What specialist services and expertise are available at or accessed by our school?</b></p>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Earlham is committed to Staff development and continuously sends staff on courses to improve provision especially for pupils with SEND. The school has a training focus for all staff to improve the teaching and learning of children including those with SEND. This includes whole school training on SEND issues such as ASD and Speech and language difficulties.</li> <li>• Our staff have been trained to deliver phonics support through the ‘Letters and Sounds’ programme.</li> <li>• We are currently training staff to deliver a range of maths support programmes including Maths Mastery.</li> <li>• The SENCO supports the class teacher in planning for children with SEND and teachers differentiate the class curriculum to support any individual needs that a child may have.</li> <li>• Individual teachers and support staff attend training courses run by outside agencies that are relevant to the needs of specific children in their class.</li> <li>• The School has a Designated Safeguarding Leader (trained at DSL level). All staff have level 1 Child protection training and a number of staff are first aid trained. All staff are trained in epi-pen administration. Clear signage exists for children with a recognised medical condition who require medication during the school day and this is managed in conjunction with the school nurse and parents.</li> <li>• We are a nut-free school and the kitchen staff are aware of children with allergies and deliver provision accordingly.</li> </ul>
<p><b>What training have the staff supporting children with special educational needs and disabilities had?</b></p>	<p>All staff receive regular safeguarding training as required by Haringey LA, along with other training (e.g. Autism awareness, differentiation) as and where a skills deficit is identified. 1:1 support staff receive training as part of their role, to effectively support their named child.</p>
<p><b>How are children included in activities outside the classroom including school trips?</b></p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Are they be able to access all of the activities of the school offers and</li> </ul>	<p><b>How we include children/young people in activities and school trips</b></p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• The school makes all possible efforts to meet the needs of children with special needs and enable them to access school trips. Earlham does this through its process of risk assessment for every outing as overseen by our Educational Visits Coordinator looking carefully at travel arrangements and ensuring the access is suitable for children with special needs.</li> <li>• We include Parents on trips whenever possible.</li> <li>• The school is happy to discuss with parents how their children’s needs can be met for educational visits.</li> </ul>

<p><b>How accessible is the school environment?</b></p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Have there been improvements in the auditory and visual environment?</li> </ul>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• The school has wheelchair access for both children and adults</li> <li>• The School has an inclusive toilet which accommodates wheel chair users</li> <li>• Equipment and facilities for SEN are held in classrooms and in our multi-sensory room</li> <li>• The ground floor of our school building is accessible to those with physical disabilities. We are able to move our classes if required in order to accommodate the needs of a child.</li> <li>• We have designated First Aid trained staff.</li> </ul>
<p><b>How does our school prepare and support children when they join?</b></p> <p><b>How does our school support children when they transfer to a new school or the next stage of education and life?</b></p>	<p>We recognise that transitions can be difficult for a child with SEND and take steps to ensure that any transition is as smooth as possible and ensures that the child feels supported and ready to make the changes.</p> <p><b>If your child is moving to another school:</b></p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• We will contact the school SENCO and ensure we pass on information.</li> <li>• We will make sure that all records about your child are passed on as soon as possible.</li> <li>• When moving classes in school: <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>- Information will be passed on to the new class teacher in advance and a hand-over meeting will take place with the new teacher. Your child's tracking will be shared with the new teacher to ensure continuity of appropriate support.</li> <li>- If your child would be helped by a book to support them understanding moving on, we will work with them to enable this to happen. The book will use photographs and provide key information for the child such as who their new teacher will be, what their new class looks like and any other important changes for the child.</li> <li>- A transition morning is timetabled towards the end of the summer term and offers the opportunity for all children to spend time in their new class and with their new teachers.</li> </ul> </li> </ul> <p><b>In Year 6:</b></p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• The SENCO will arrange and attend transition meetings with the SENCO of their secondary school.</li> <li>• When possible, Class teachers will have the opportunity to meet with staff from the secondary school during the summer visits from Secondary schools.</li> <li>• Your child will be provided with access to a Secondary Transition group to support their understanding of</li> </ul>

<p><b>How does the school support my child's emotional and social development and what measures are in place to prevent bullying?</b></p>	<p>The school fully supports the development of every child's Social, Emotional and Mental Health. We teach and promote core values and work with a range of agencies and experience professional to ensure that we are providing our pupils with the skills, tools and support to help the to develop into happy, confident and resilient individuals who recognise and understand the importance of discussing issues and positively seeking solution focused approaches to problems. We have a school counsellor who visits our school on a weekly basis to support some of our most vulnerable pupils. Further information can be found in our Anti-Bullying Policy.</p>
<p><b>What is an EHCP?</b></p> <p><b>What happens if my child has an EHCP?</b></p>	<p>EHCP (Education Health and Care Plan) has replaced the Statement of Special Educational Needs (SEN) and the Learning Difficulties Assessment (LDA). An EHCP is written in partnership with you and your child. It describes the additional specialist support your child requires in order to meet their outcomes.</p> <p>The EHCP will assess and consider your child's education, health and care needs. Before the EHCP is written, professionals will involve you in assessing your child's needs. If we think your child should be assessed for an EHCP we will contact you to discuss the process in more detail. For more information on EHCPs, see the Haringey Local Offer.</p> <p>Your child will have identified needs and an EHCP in place. We will be constantly reviewing your child's progress as per the assess-plan-do-review cycle aforementioned. They will have an LSA (learning support assistant) who works with them for a set number of hours a day and parents are welcome to speak to them before or after school.</p>
<p><b>Where can I find information about the 'Ordinarily Available Document'?</b></p>	<p>Local Authorities are also required to publish services they expect to be available for its children with SEN aged 0-25. This is called the Ordinarily Available Document. This details the provision that should be found in any school in the Local Authority. <p><b>What is a care plan?</b></p>	<p>A Care Plan is written for pupils, with the support of our School Nurse, where medical needs are significant. This is shared on a need-to-know basis. Dietary needs are also taken into consideration. Support is in place for developing social skills at playtimes (e.g. buddies/ sports/ quiet club at lunch time) and other school clubs to choose from.</p>
